- This calls for remaking the economy.

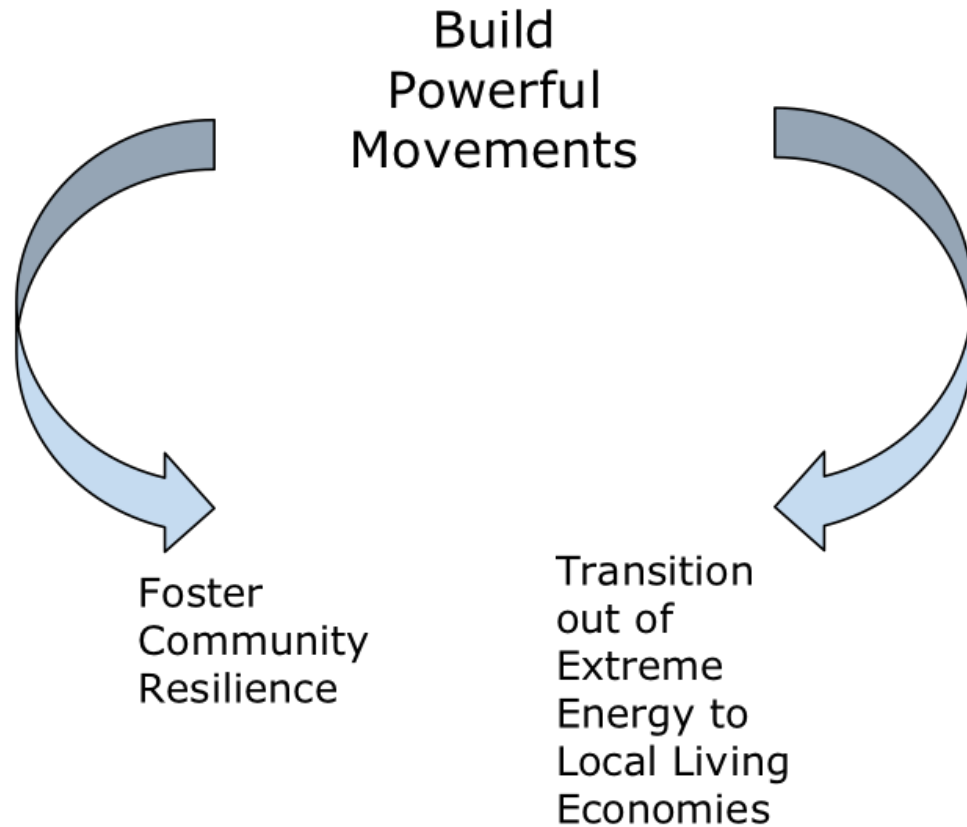

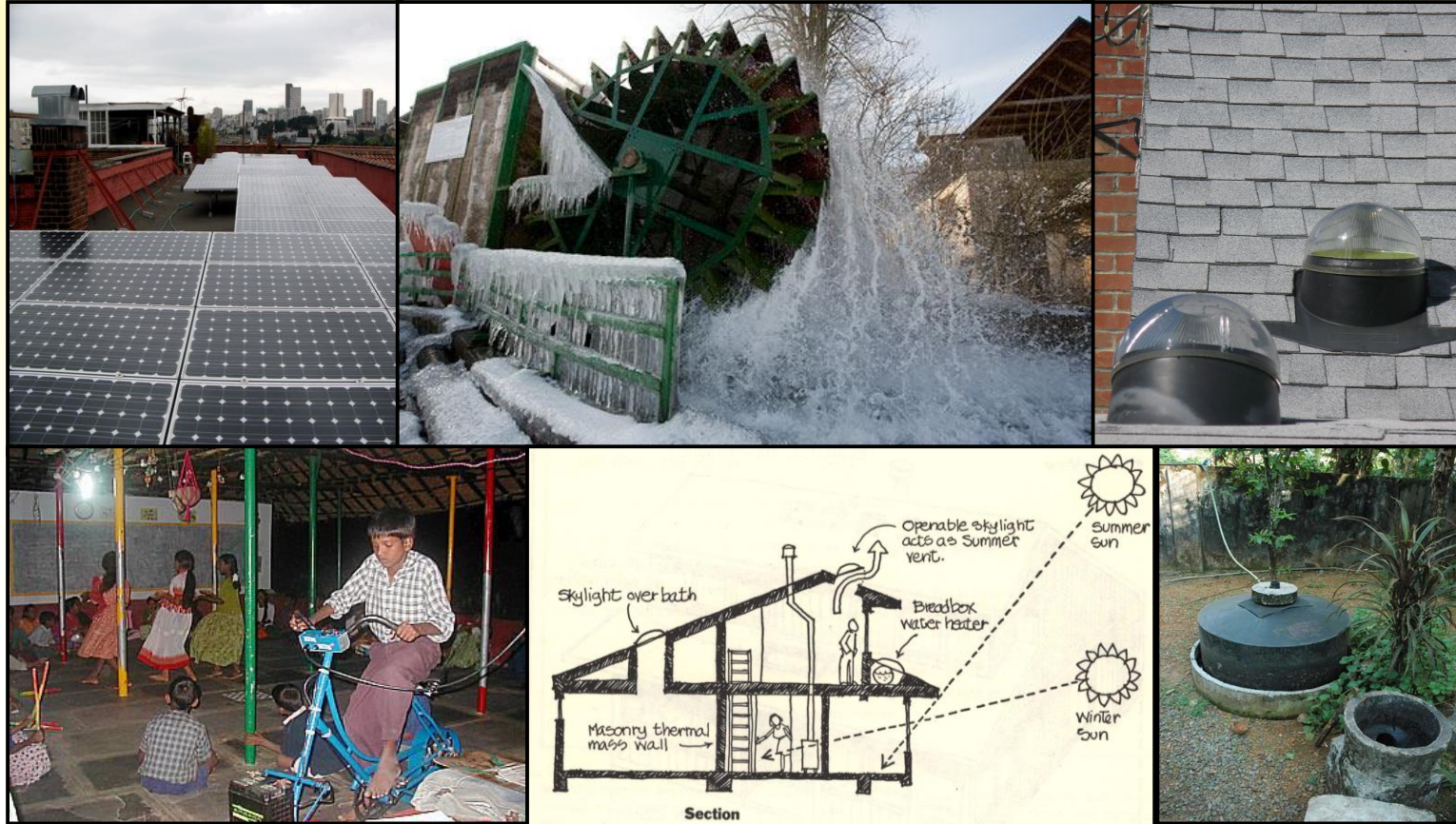

cities that move in mass



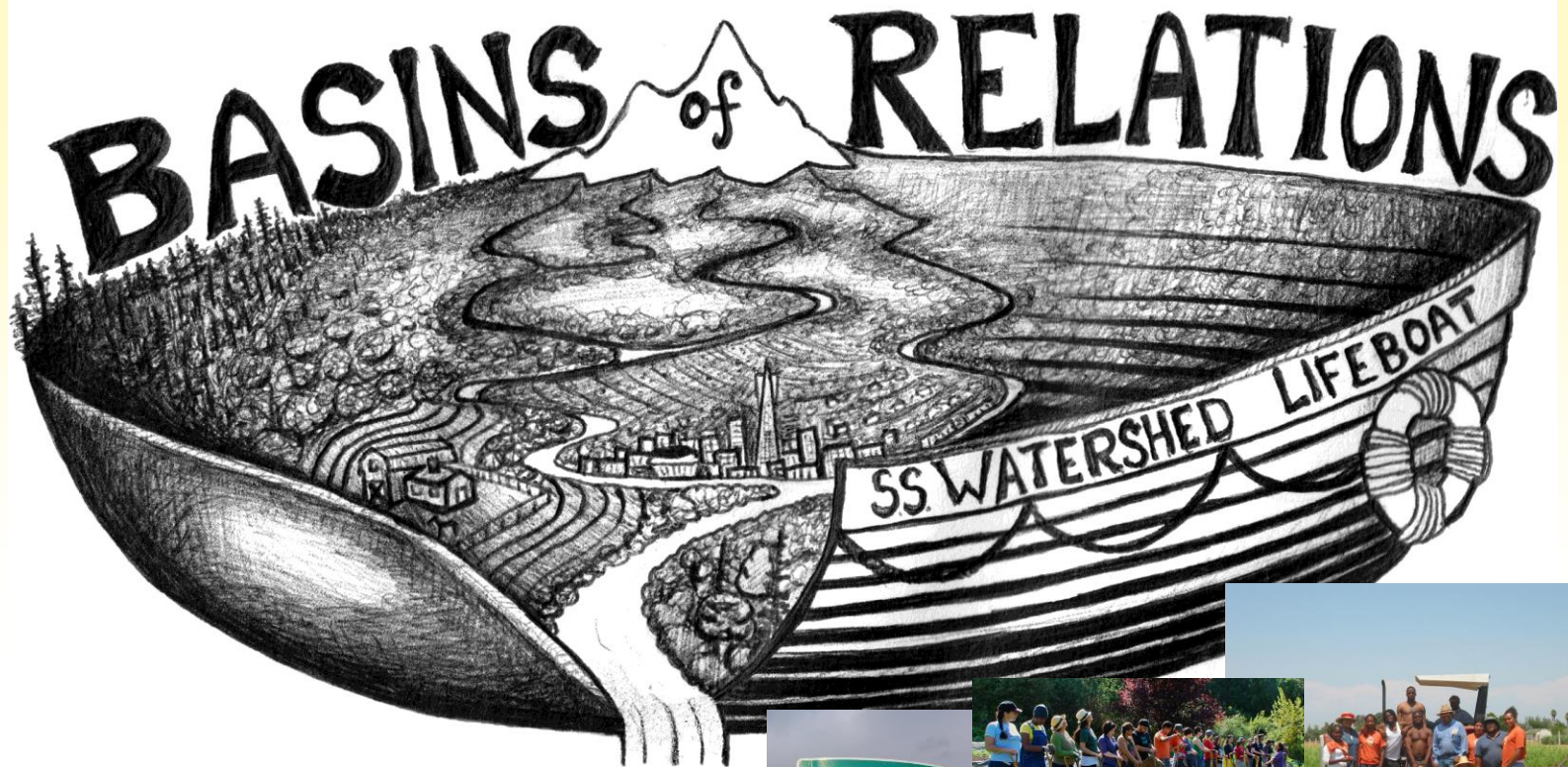
accessible, public, free, frequent, appropriate to place, integrative

and nobody lives better**

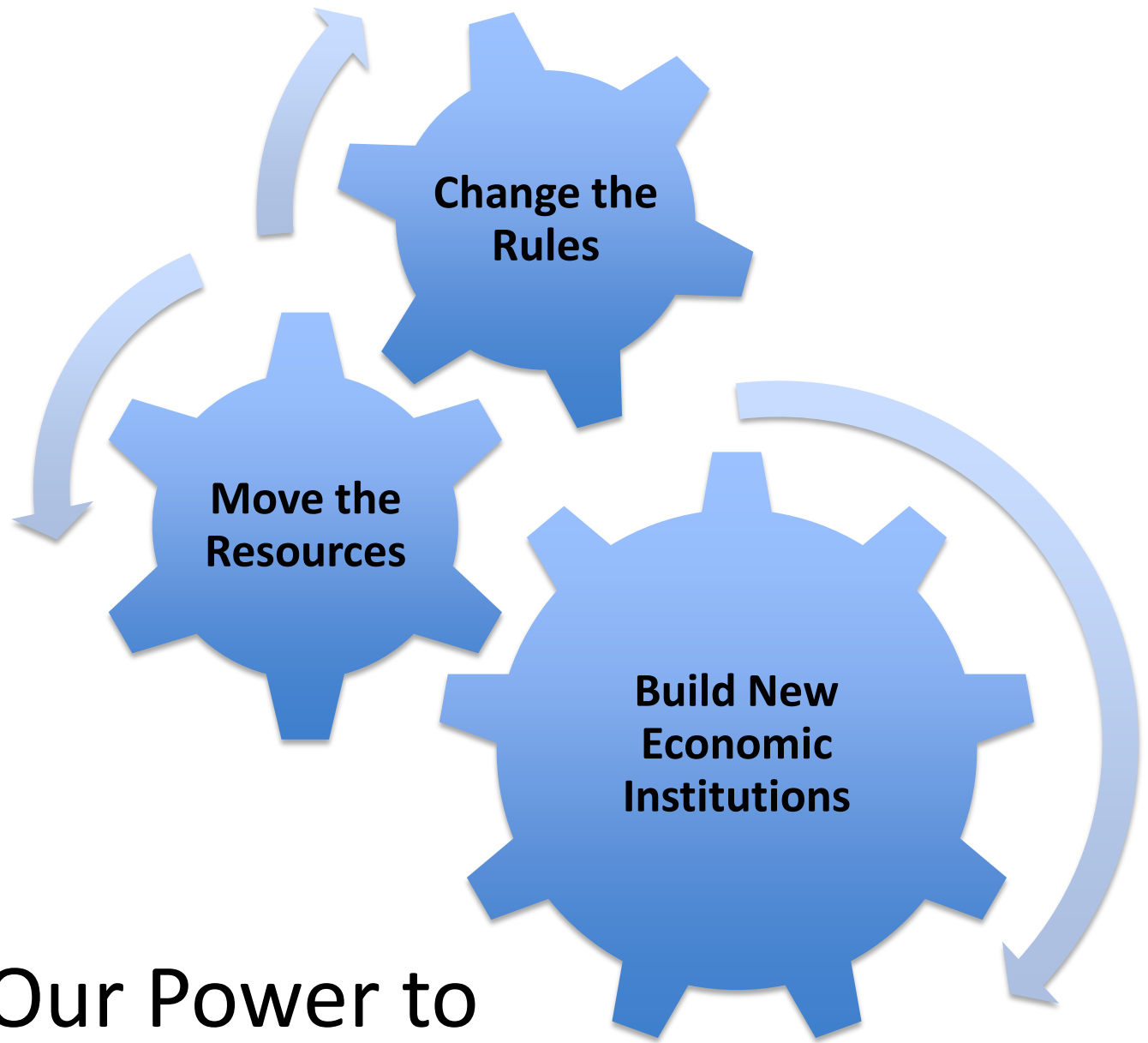

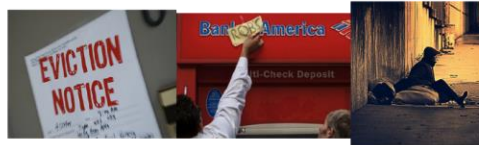
